Altogether the money coral reefs make is around tens of billions of U.S dollars per year. These ecosystems are important to indigenous people all over the world. Record Junk Floating in Space The orbiting lab jettisoned a 2.9 ton (5800 pounds) pallet of used batteries on the

morning of March 11th. It was the most massive object they have ever discarded into space. The space junk is expected to fall back to Earth in about 2 - 4 years, but agency officials also said that it will burn harmlessly in the atmosphere, yet not everyone is so sure.

"This strikes me (haha, a pun given the circumstances) as dangerous. It seems big and dense so it's unlikely to burn up completely," astronomer and author Phil Plait, wrote on Twitter.

"Yes. On the other hand e.g. Tiangong-1 was 7500 kg [kilograms], which is much bigger. But I would say given how dense EP9 is, it's concerning, albeit at the low end of concerning," astronomer and satellite Jonathan McDowell responded.

Tiangong-1 was China's first prototype space station which ended up crashing down back to Earth over the Pacific Ocean in April 2018 and EP9, the abbreviation for Exposed Pallet 9, is the recently jettisoned object. EP9 came to the station last year on a Japanese HTV (H-II Transfer Vehicle). Dumping EP9 wasn't the original idea, EP9 was left behind last year due to a failed 2018 Soyuz launch. It was supposed to be packed into the disposable HTV which sent them down, like the ones before this pallet.

So since EP9 was left behind, space station managers decided to throw it overboard using a 57.7 foot long robotic arm. The EP9 has plenty of space junk company with him. According to the European Space Agency, researchers estimate that the orbit is crowded with debris objects everywhere.

Sarah Moonshadow, a Boulder resident, told the officers "I just said 'Nicholas run,' and he said 'No, don't move.' I said 'Run right now we have three seconds,' and then he started running." She also said, "And then he shot towards us, we could feel it, and we kept going. We just ran and there was someone laying in the road."

The suspect's name was found as Ahmad Al Aliwi Alissa, who lived in a nearby suburb, Arvada, and was arrested on the scene. He was charged on Tuesday with 10 counts of first - degree murder, which means it has the penalty of life imprisonment.

The people he murdered included an important officer, and 9 other residents. "I feel numb. And it's heartbreaking," the chief said at a news conference. Officer Talley - and his 7 children - along with his wife were just at her office last week so that Talley could get his award. "He loved this community," she said. "He's everything that policing deserves and needs." President Joe Biden said, "Officer Talley did not hesitate in his duty, making the ultimate sacrifice in his effort to save lives. That's the definition of an American hero."

Alissa's brother told The Daily Beast that Alissa was paranoid and antisocial. That was probably why he started shooting at King Soopers.

"We can overcome opposition by cowardly politicians and the pressure of a gun lobby that opposes any limit on the ability of anyone to assemble an arsenal," Obama said. "We can, and we must."
